9/10 Textiles

Senior textiles have been exploring the design process and creation of simple garments, accessories and plushies.

They completed lined pouches with zips. This served as a bit of a challenge as none of the students had ever inserted a zipper before.

The students are currently working on sewing, knitting and crochet skills in their final projects







Junior Woodwork

This term, Year 8 students have been working hard on developing theoretical knowledge and a range of practical skills. At the beginning of the term, students were introduced to technical drawing, where we practised communicating design ideas through Technical Drawing. Recently, students have been in the workshop familiarising themselves with a range of hand tools as they're progressing through a range of timber joints such as Rebate, Half-Lapped and T-Halving joins. A key aspect throughout the course has been attention to detail and communication, which the students have embraced. It will be exciting to see these students transfer their newfound skills moving forward, as they look to construct their puzzle project.

Senior Design and Technology

Throughout the semester students have had the opportunity to craft a six-piece timber Burr puzzle. The beauty of the puzzle lies within its construction. Students have had to develop skills that relate to reading orthographic projections (top view and side view) of the puzzle pieces and then place measurements onto their pieces of timber. Once the students have marked up their pieces, they

then remove the timber using a tenon saw, chisel and mallet. Once all the pieces have been made, the puzzle then tells the students where to refine their work so that the pieces can fit together to form the finished project.

For those students who have completed their puzzle they have had the choice to move onto other projects that have captured their attention. Some of these projects have included Infinity Cubes requiring students to set the band saw up so that they are able to reproduce the required timber bridal joints several times over. Other students have chosen to try their hand at scroll saw projects.

Student have also had the opportunity to explore the factors that affect timber growth in Australia through a written project. The written task has allowed students to explore biological, environmental, and geographical factors that can impact tree growth, specifically in Australia.







Year 8 Food Technology

In Year 8 Food Tech, students have been learning to cook a range of meals: Spaghetti Bolognese, Veggie fritters, and Taco salad. This is a part of the OzHarvest program, where they explore the significance of minimising food waste. Post-cooking, they assess their waste output, emphasising the importance of consuming a varied range of foods while being mindful of leftovers.







Year 9/10 Food Technology

In 9/10 Food Technology, students are tasked with the creative challenge of designing a child's birthday party, with emphasis on cupcake design and decorating techniques. As Line 6 students immerse themselves in the cinematic world with a movie-themed party concept, Line 2 embark on a festive journey with holiday-inspired festivities. Meanwhile, Line 1 students are engaged in crafting a sustainable and seasonal three-course meal. Through this assessment, students not only refine their baking and decorating skills but also gain a deeper understanding of thematic event planning and the importance of sustainability in food preparation.











Term Two, 2024 Student Services Team Update



It is WK 7, Term 2, 2024, we have passed the halfway mark and are on the downhill run, only a few more weeks to go before we are on school holidays. I wanted to give you a few quick reminders and seek your support so we can all finish strong.

Energy Drinks

<u>The ACT Public Schools Food and Drink Policy</u> was published in 2017 and it outlines the Education Directorate's commitment to healthy food and drink ins ACT public schools. As part of this all schools prohibit Energy Drinks being sold an/or consumed at the school.

We have seen an increase in some of our young people drinking these (Monster, Rockstar, Red Bull & Powerade) throughout the day. Our School Youth Health Nurse, Mel has shared with you the impact they can have on the developing brain and bodies of our young people. Our teaching staff observe the impact these drinks have on our students including greater irritability, difficulty focusing on learning and lower thresholds for tolerating change.

If an energy drink is brought onto school grounds, the student will be asked to hand it in to the front office for collection. Families will receive an email from the Student Services Team outlining the incident. If you have any questions or concerns, please just reach out; we appreciate your support.

For more information families may like to consider watching this 15-minute video from the ABC's Catalyst program. Please note that the video tells the real-life story of a teenager's death after consuming pre-mixed alcohol and energy drinks. The video then investigates what is an energy drink, and what happens to people's bodies when they consume energy drinks. Medical experts are interviewed on the topic, as well as a representative from the Australian Beverages Council.

Positive Behaviours for Learning

<u>Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL)</u>, is an evidence-based, multi-tiered behavioural framework that supports positive outcomes for all students in their social, emotional, and academic development. The focus is on building whole school, initiative-taking systems, and practices, which reduce the need for reactive interventions.

At Lanyon, this term we are focussing on: we use public language in public places, and we seek your support to have conversations with your young people about appropriate and respectful language at school.

School Uniform

A school's dress standard plays an important role in promoting a positive image of the school and creating a sense of identity among students. Each ACT public school has a dress standard which for primary and high schools involves a school uniform. In high schools this includes a formal style option, which may be the sole uniform option or offered alongside a less formal option.

The Lanyon School Uniform procedure is underpinned by the ACT Education's <u>Dress Standards and Uniform in Canberra Public Schools Policy</u>. The Lanyon Uniform Procedures were updated in 2023 to include plain blue or black bottoms, with or without the school logo. We do have a small number of second-hand uniforms available for families and you are encouraged to reach out if you need some support. Additionally, young people grow so fast so and we welcome donations of any clean unwanted school uniforms.

If your young person attends school out of uniform, they will be sent to Student Services to change into a clean second-hand uniform, and you will receive an email from the Student Services Team to let you know.

In addition to ensuring you have access to the Google Classrooms, you may like to check out the <u>Curriculum Documents</u> on the schools website. These documents provide an outline of what is being completed in class and the assessment schedule. CHANGES TO DRESS STANDARDS AND UNIFORMS IN CANBERRA PUBLIC SCHOOLS

What Has Changed?

In Term 3, 2016 the ACT Government Education Directorate released the Dress Standards and Uniforms in Canberra Public Schools Policy, replacing the Dress Standards and Colour Codes in Public Schools (2010) policy. The new policy will require all Canberra public schools to create and implement their own uniform and dress standards in partnership with their school communities.

The new policy has been introduced in response to a 2014 survey that found Canberra parents are overwhelmingly in favour of seeing school uniforms in high schools. Under the changes, primary schools and high schools will be required to have a school uniform. High schools will also be required to offer their students the option of a formal-style school uniform. All public primary schools currently have a uniform, and the majority of public high schools currently have a uniform, with approximately half of the high schools also offering students a formal style uniform.

The new policy will require changes for a small number of high schools, who will need to undertake a process with input from the school community to identify a formal uniform option. The purpose of the policy is to provide direction and advice to schools in developing and implementing school-based student dress standards policy and procedures.

Supporting Student Health and Wellbeing

Schools Principals are able to make changes to uniform requirements for individual students to ensure student's health and wellbeing. Principals can grant individual students short- and long-term modifications and exemptions when the wearing of a uniform causes personal disadvantage outlined in anti-discrimination and human rights legislation, has implications for the student's health, or ability to comply with requirements relating to their ethno-religious background.

When creating new uniform policy schools are required to consult with students, staff and parents/carers about the processes and procedures associated with the school-based policy as well as consulting on the design of the uniform. Schools will also work with their school community to ensure that uniforms:

- Are comfortable, hard-wearing and affordable for families
- Provide adequate sun protection
- Are suitable for all students regardless of gender identity, preferred presentation, ethnicity, religion, age, pregnancy or body shape
- Are appropriate for students with disabilities
- Are sourced from ethical producers
- Comply with all health and safety, human rights and anti-discrimination laws.

Benefits of Uniforms

School uniforms have been linked to creating a stronger sense of school identity, especially when developed in partnership with the school community. This stronger sense of identity has been linked in turn to improved student wellbeing. School uniforms have a number of other benefits, including:

- Promoting a sense of belonging among students
- Making school clothing more affordable for families and reducing perceived pressure for students to wear fashionable items
- Promoting the safety of students through easier identification
- Helping students to learn the importance of appropriate presentation.

Cost of Uniforms

Some parents and caregivers may be reluctant to support uniforms due to concerns about the initial costs. Under the new policy, school boards are required to consider the costs to families when designing a dress standards policy and uniform and must inform school communities about how they will provide access to uniforms for families who may find it difficult to afford a uniform. This could include reducing costs to parents through approaches such as bulk purchasing, clothing pools, providing items for loan and a staged introduction of new uniform options.

Mobile phone policy for all ACT public schools applies this term

You are reminded that the new <u>Personal Use of Communication Devices in ACT Public Schools Policy</u> now applies in all schools from term 2, 2024.

For students at Lanyon High School (LHS) this means:

- Students in years P-10 at ACT public schools may not use or access personal communications devices at school, including recess and lunch, or during school authorised events.
- At LHS, "...at school..." means, on school grounds between the hours of 8am and 3pm, Monday to Friday.
- Phones are not to be used in the classroom or the playground. Phones should not be visible
 or audible during 8am to 3pm. All phones must be in bags and on silent.

- Students are strongly encouraged to leave their phones and other personal devices at home.
- Further information is available by accessing the Mobile Phone Procedures for Lanyon High School on the school's website.

Special considerations and exemptions

Exemptions can be requested if a student needs their device/assistive technology:

- to manage or monitor a medical condition
- to help meet caring or family responsibilities
- to support adjustments for students with disability as part of an agreed individual learning plan. If you have not applied for an exemption, please speak with our front office.

Energy drinks at school



Hi Parents and Carers!

Energy drink consumption by High School students is on the rise. Here are some interesting facts about energy drinks:

- US Navy pilots are not allowed to consume energy drinks 24 hours before flying as research shows they are more likely to make mistakes after having an energy drink
- It is not recommended to have caffeine after 2pm as caffeine remains in the body for at least 6 hours
- As caffeine is a stimulant it can impact your sleep, it can stop you falling asleep, cause a
 disrupted sleep, and a reduced quality of sleep.
- There are thousands of reported emergency room visits in which an energy drink was cited as the primary cause of, or a contributing factor to a health problem
- Health issues associated with energy drinks include severe anxiety and depressive symptoms, headaches, irregular heartbeats, heart attacks, higher body temps, seizures and even death young adults and adolescents are particularly attracted to energy drinks because of effective product marketing, peer influence and a lack of knowledge of the potential harmful

effects. If you are concerned that your child is consuming energy drinks on a regular basis, please reach out and I would be happy to provide them with some support and education.



Responding to Your Child's Strong Emotions

WHAT IS THE RESPONDING TO YOUR CHILD'S STRONG EMOTIONS PARENT WORKSHOP?
Responding to your Child's Strong Emotions is a 2-hour workshop facilitated by the School Psychology Service aimed at helping parents/carers address their child's challenging, violent, or destructive behaviours. During the workshop parents/carers have the opportunity to develop a clear plan to address their child's challenging behaviours.

WHAT DOES THE WORKSHOP INVOLVE?
Each workshop will have approximately 12 participating families (one or both parents/carers) and is facilitated by two school psychologists. Activities are based on the Non-Violent Resistance evidence-based therapeutic approach. Your child does not attend the workshop with you.

ARE THERE ANY RISKS FOR PARTICIPANTS?

It's possible that when participants start to use the strategies taught in the program, they or their child may initially experience a higher level of distress as challenging behaviours are addressed. However, as participants continue learning and practicing a wider range of strategies, these are likely to reduce.

HOW WILL INFORMATION BE KEPT AND SHARED?

Information shared within the group is confidential and is not shared outside of the workshop. Should facilitators become concerned about a child's safety or well-being external agencies will be notified. Where appropriate, the facilitators will endeavour to assist families to identify the appropriate next steps in gaining support.

At the end of the workshop participants will be asked to complete short questionnaire. This data is used to evaluate the effectiveness of the program. File notes regarding parent/carer involvement in the program will be recorded, stored securely, and placed on an electronic student School Psychology file.

Pre Learner-Driving Course



Year 10 Week 10 Term 2 Pre Learner-Driving Course

During Week 10 this term year 10 will have the opportunity to complete their Pre Learner-Driver course here at Lanyon High School. At the conclusion of the course students will have the opportunity to complete their Learner Driver's License. For those students who have already completed their Pre Learner-Driving Course they will be expected to find and attend work experience (WEX) for the duration of week 10. Students having trouble deciding or contacting WEX employers are advised to speak to their PC teacher or our WEX coordinator Alex Brown.

Unfortunately for our students who live in NSW the ACT Pre Learner Drivers Course will not be accepted when applying for a NSW drivers' licence. For these students it will be expected that they organise Work Experience during week 10.
